Hearty Welcome to the Western Australians Tasmania out to Restore Prestige

The State Team will be flat out at North today to restore some of its prestige, which suffered such a dent in the 1969 A.N.F.C. Championship in Adelaide.

In spite of the drubbing the team received against Western Australia when they last met, the match today should be a good one.

Football patrons will remember the great performances given by the Tasmanian Team in the 1966 Championship in Hobart when they soundly trounced the V.F.A. and almost topped the Western Australians in the next match, when the scores were Western Australia 17.13 (115) d. Tasmania 16.10 (106).

Tasmania followed this with a close match against South Australia, when only bad kicking for goal robbed it of victory.

It was said by A.N.F.C. Officials after the Championships that Tasmania had truly arrived at senior status, but their words rang a hollow echo in Adelaide last season, when after a good effort against the V.F.L., the State team were soundly beaten by both Western Australia and South Australia.

But time works wonders with most injuries, and today our team is on its own "dunghill" and looking forward to redeeming itself in the eyes of the football public.

After their hard game against the V.F.L. last Saturday, the Western Australians will have settled down into their

team work, a disadvantage which Tasmania has to face, because of lack of playing hard games together.

However, the local Intra-State matches have given the Selectors several opportunities to pick out the stars and if the team can settle down early they should press the Western Australians all the way.

Tasmania has had some great matches against their close friends from the West and have had their moments of glory.

Back in 1911 in the Adelaide Championships, Tasmania scored 8.14 (62) to defeat Western Australia 8.9 (57).

It was not until 1958 that the State recorded its next win and that was in the Centenary Championship in Melbourne in 1958, when, in a never-to-be forgotten night match at South Melbourne Oval, they scored 13.16 (94) to 11.12 (78).

They did not have to wait so long to score the third victory, this being done in shocking conditions in Perth in 1963, when in very high winds and with forty-five points of rain recorded during the match, they outplayed the Western Australians, kicking 9.10 (61) to 6.13 (49).

The Western Australians, however, were after Tassie's blood and in the return match in 1964 at North Hobart handed out a decent old hiding to the tune of 24.15 (159) to 5.7 (37).

The State Team will also be thinking of this humiliation, together with

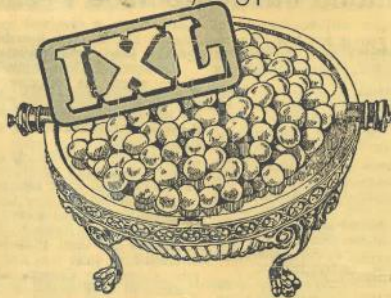

Pen Sketches of West Australian Players

MAI BROWN — (East Perth Captain/Coach)—Ruck or centre half-forward. One of five playing coaches with the side, and the youngest of them at 23. Won last year's Sandover Medal (WA NFL fairest and best). Classy player, he reads the play and positions himself accordingly. Strong mark, long kick, could be the side's centre half forward. Ten State teams.

CAM BLAKEMORE — (Subiaco) — Centreman—Polished footballer, pacy, he displays great anticipation, is an excellent mark and kick. Difficult to check and has a great understanding with Metropolis and Robertson. First State team.

GREG BREHAUT — (Perth)—Winger—Strong left-foot kick. Likes heavy conditions, plays the ball close to the ground and gets down after it. He is at his best when the going is tough. State teams 1966-67-69. One of five All-Australian players of 1969.

PETER BURTON — (Subiaco)—Ruck—This tall, rangy player has developed into one of the State's top tap ruckmen. Difficult to get off balance, he runs for long spells on the ball with his club. Marks strongly around the ground. First State team.

CARROL LINDSAY — (Claremont) — Centre half-forward or half-forward flank. Talented, high marking, long kicking player who reads the play and is difficult to check. Ground play excellent for a tall player. First State team.

LEN CLARK — (South Fremantle) — Half-forward flank—Has played prominently since his first League game in W.A. on May 2. Clark is the former Collingwood and Preston player. He has starred on the half-forward flank. Pacy, play-on type and strong mark.

BILL DEMPSEY — (West Perth) — Ruck—Physically strong and creative player and noted for his high marking, long kicking around the ground and tight play "resting" in defence. Played against the VFL (MCG) 1967.

BRUCE DUPEROUZEL — (Claremont) — Rover—Second year player showing great promise. Pacy, excellent mark, kick and ground player. First State team.

GRAHAM FARMER — (West Perth, captain-coach)—Captain-coach of touring side. In spite of his age, he is still one of the top players anywhere. One of the most knowledgeable ruckmen in Australia today, with the pressure on, Farmer with his all-round ability will be invaluable to his team on the field. His record includes the Sandover Medals (1956-60); Tassie Medal (1956); All-Australian teams (1956-58-61) W.A. captain 1961. East Perth fairest and best 1954-55-56-57, 59,60-61) Captained Geelong for three years.

HASSA MANN — (South Fremantle captain-coach)—Centre half-forward—Needs no introduction to Victorian footy fans. Former captain of Melbourne and that club's fairest and best three times. Pen Sketches of Tasmanian Players

JOHN DEVINE — (North Hobart) — Captain/Coach of his club and the Tasmanian Team, who needs no introduction to football patrons. Originally from Geelong, he has really settled in to his new State and has been an inspiration to the game.

A fearless and mobile player, who plays the game hard and asks no quarter and gives none.

DARREL BALDOCK — (Latrobe) — Captain/Coach of his club and of the N.W.F.U., and Vice-Captain of the Tasmanian Team. Perhaps one of the most devastating forwards ever to play the game. An All-Australian team Captain, has played many years with St. Kilda—a real champion.

RICKY GRAHAM—(New Norfolk)— Captain/Coach of his club in his first year in Tasmania, having transferred from Geelong. A determined and experienced half-back, and can also adapt himself to the centre. A great acquisition to this State and covered himself in glory by winning the Weller Arnold Medal for the Best and Fairest player in the recent Intra-State series.

MEL ARNOLD — (North Hobart) — One of the 'big boys' of the team. Can play equally as well in the ruck or full forward. Has a fine pair of hands, takes the big mark and is an accurate kick for goal. Has done very well this season.

BOB WHITEHOUSE — (Clarence) — A tall high player who is equally at home in the ruck or resting in the back pocket. Has shown excellent form with his club this season—played very well in the combined games. Has great potential.

GEOFF WHITON — (Ulverstone) — Captain/Coach of his club. Formally from Sandy Bay before he transferred

to play with Melbourne. Has been a previous member of the Tasmanian State Team—given great service to game. A high flyer and does particularly well both in the ruck or resting in pocket positions.

PAUL VINAR — (Longford) — Captain Coach of his club. Has given great service to Tasmania since his transfer from Geelong. A full back of outstanding ability and perhaps still one of the longest kicks in the game today. Paul is a great team man who encourages his younger players.

ADRIAN BOWDEN — (Clarence) — A rugged and very strong half-back who knows how to come through. Is a sure mark and reliable kick and a good ground player. Formerly of Hobart as a schoolboy, he played with Melbourne in the V.F.L.

JOHN JILLARD — (Latrobe) — A recent arrival from Melbourne and has played particularly well in Intra-State matches this season. A former Footscray half-back and utility player who plays the typical Victorian style and makes his opponent earn every kick.

MAX UROUHART — (Wynyard) — Captain/Coach of his club. Also a recent arrival from Melbourne and plays a similar type of game to that of John Jillard. Played with Essendon in the V.F.L., and is a great acquisition to Tasmanian football.

JIM FROST — (Ulverstone) — No doubt one of the best ruckmen in the State today. Has been knocking at the

KAYDEN EDWARDS — (Wynyard) — A newcomer to the team with fine performances this season. A great pocket back, who knows how to look after his opponent. Only twenty-three he has years of football ahead of him and is expected to do really well.

ROGER STEELE — (Sandy Bay) — A brilliant centreman with very accurate and telling disposal of the ball to his team mates. A good ball getter and handler and a good mark and kick for his size. Last season's T.F.L. Best and Fairest Medal Winner.

His great marking and kicking for goal was a feature of his play in Intra-State matches this season. He has no respect for reputations and should go a long way in the game.

JOHN BINGLEY — (Clarence) — Captain/Coach of his club. A great player, who can adapt himself to any position on the field. He is fearless and gives everything he has got. Has had many Intra-State and State Guernseys, and played with St. Kilda in the V.F.L. It is a delight to see him back in the team.

GRAIG COOMBES — (City-South) — Another one of the team's youngsters, who has the ball at his feet. A half-forward or winger of no mean ability. He is fast and a good mark and kick for his size. We will hear a lot of this player in the near future.

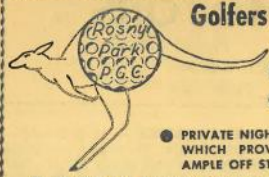
