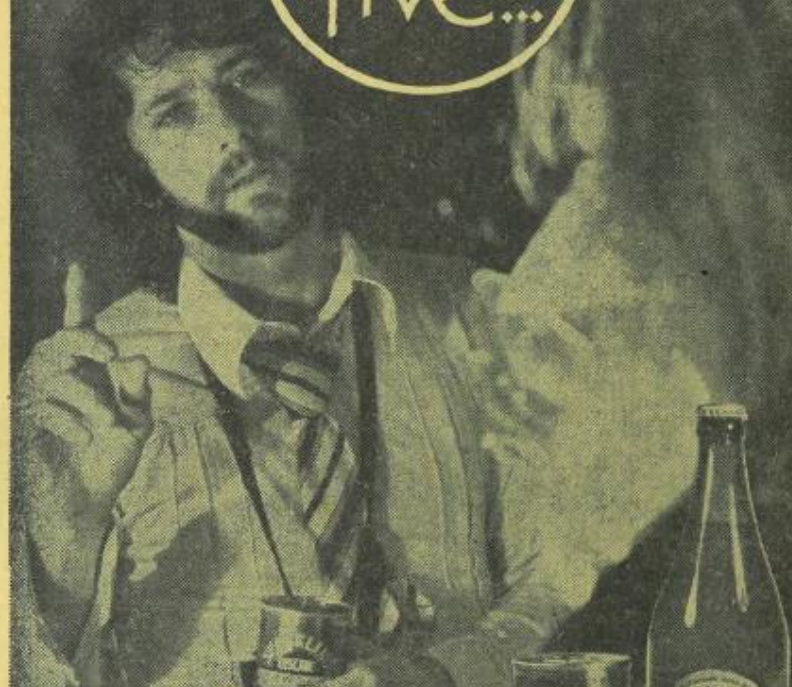

STATE GRAND FINAL Welcome to North Launceston

Football supporters in Hobart will be treated to a real feast of football today.

We extend a most hearty welcome to the two teams from the North Launceston Club. We trust they will have a most enjoyable stay in Hobart and we wish them, together with our local teams, the best of luck in today's games.

Although little is known, here in the South, of the individual players from the North Launceston Club, they are coming to Hobart with a most impressive record. Having won the N.T.F.A. Premiership after losing the 2nd semi-final and therefore having had to fight back to gain the right to challenge again, they easily accounted for Wynyard last Saturday, who had won the N.W.F.U. Premiership from the same position.

There is a remarkable similarity between today's teams — North Launceston and Glenorchy.

Both Clubs appointed new Coaches this year and both have been successful in winning their local premierships in their first years.

Glenorchy have not won the T.F.L. Premiership since 1965 when they were State Premiers.

North Launceston have not won the N.T.F.A. Premiership since 1963 when they were runners-up to Burnie for the State title.

The two Clubs have not met in a State Premiership since 1948/49 with New Town winning in 1948 and North Launceston in 1949.

The State Premiership game in 1948 was one of the most exciting finishes ever seen in Hobart.

North Launceston, a very powerful side, had built up a tremendous lead and seemed assured of winning the Premiership. John Leedham, the young

star from North, had "collided" with Bill Tonks and went out of the game. Tonks was replaced by Roy Cazaly, Junior.

Gradually New Town closed the gap until only points separated the two teams. With the timekeeper's hand on the bell, Brian Kelly short passed to Lou Sutton, who took a courageous mark against stiff opposition. From 60 yards out, dead in front, Lou kicked truly and New Town won the day.

Lou Sutton is the father of Glenorchy's Captain for today, Darryl Sutton.

The squads from which each will select their final teams are also similar. The average age of the two squads is 22½ years of age, the average height is over 182 cms or 6'0" and the average weight is in excess of 80 kilos or 12 stone 9 lbs.

The oldest player in North Launceston is 28, the youngest 16 — for Glenorchy the oldest is 32, the youngest 17.

One of the star players of the North Launceston team will be Ian Marsh, winner of the Hec. Smith Medal for the best and fairest player in the N.T.F.A. Competition. Likewise, Trevor Sprigg, the winner of the William Leitch Medal in the T.F.L., will be playing for Glenorchy.

The respective full-forwards, Dale Frost and Peter Hudson, each topped the goalkicking lists in their respective competitions.

North Launceston were represented in Tasmanian sides this season by their coach, Peter Daniel and Bruce Neish. State representatives from Glenorchy were their Coach, Peter Hudson together with Trevor Sprigg, Darryl Sutton and John Pilkington.

The prize for today's game is not only the State Premiership, but the opportunity to compete in Adelaide against the best Club teams in Australia. Either side will be worthy representatives of this State and we wish them both the best of luck today.

CURTAIN-RAISER

For the first time the premier sides from the Third division in each competition will meet to decide the under-age State Premiership.

North Launceston Under 19's finished second on the roster ladder but won through to take out the N.T.F.A. Premiership and then defeated Ulverstone Under 19's in the State Preliminary Final.

Today North Launceston will meet Clarence Thirds, who were under 18 years of age on 1st January. Earlier in the season, a combined team from the League Thirds defeated a combined Under 19 side from the N.T.F.A. at North Hobart. The two competitions seem to be evenly matched and it will be interesting to see the relative strength of the individual Club teams.

Five members of the North Launceston team were members of the N.T.F.A. squad from which the team was chosen to play in Hobart. They were Michael Pyskowski, Garry Bennetts, Shane McHenry, J. Keogh and Kim Gillard.

Clarence were represented in the same game by P. Hammond, D. Peacock, G. Prestrucci and G. Burdon.

In the T.F.L. Thirds Grand Final last Saturday, Clarence and Sandy Bay played some of the finest football of the whole final series. We are looking forward to a similar display today.

CONGRATULATIONS

Congratulations are due to the Glenorchy Club for winning the T.F.L. Premiership last Saturday in a typical Grand Final battle with Sandy Bay. The Bay looked to have a chance of snatching victory in the last quarter, but it is to Glenorchy's credit that they steadied to run out victors.

Having already won the B.P. Cup, Glenorchy have the chance today to prove they are the best Club side in the State.

New Norfolk are to be congratulated on annexing the Reserves Premiership. A match winning break in the third quarter enabled the Eagles to withstand the final quarter burst from North Hobart.

Clarence proved themselves the outstanding team in the Thirds competition. The team is to be congratulated not only on winning the Grand Final, but the excellent performance throughout the whole season.

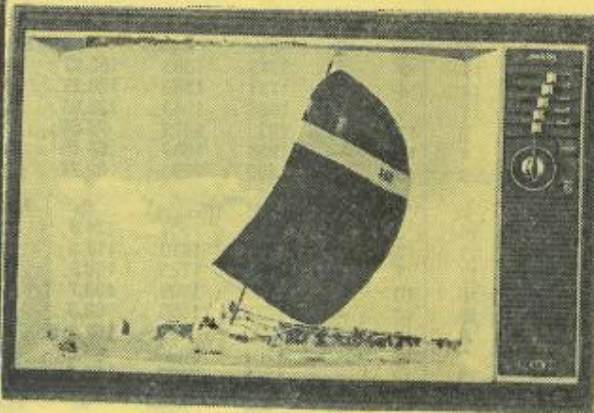

BETWEEN T.F.L., N.T.F.A. AND N.W.F.U. PREMIER TEAMS FOR THE NORTH HOBART OLD PLAYERS' AND OFFICIALS' ASSOCIATION TROPHY

It was the practice for several years for the Southern and Northern premier teams to play matches prior to the introduction of the Official State Premier-ships in 1909, between the two as-

BUMPING

Bumping is fair if it is done by the hip, shoulder or chest and the opponent is contacted in any of these places. Bumping a player in the back is not permitted.

Charging, bumping or pushing a player when the ball is more than five yards away is a foul. These breaches are also not permitted after the player has disposed of the ball. In such cases the free kick goes to the team mate nearest to where the ball lands or is marked. This rule has been introduced in order to prevent spiteful play after a player has disposed of the ball.

When in the act of bumping, the body should be tensed, the elbows tucked in at the sides, fists clenched and the feet should be well spread to allow the hip to swing into the bump. Jabbing with the elbows is a foul.

NORTH HOBART NOTES

LOOKING BACK

By Noel Thompson

Today with another season drawing to a close the writer shall endeavour to bring to our own football public as well as to our visitors from the North a short but concise history of the North Hobart Club. To followers of football over the years, and in particular to some of our more formidable opponents, tradition has always been linked with the name of the North Hobart Football Club, and a look back into the past may enlighten us as to how this trait evolved.

John Devine's connection with the Waggon & Horses Hotel completes a full turn of the waggon wheel, for in 1895 the North Hobart Club was founded by a group of young men who used to enjoy the convivial glass and a game of cards at the "Waggon."

The Club first played football in a paddock situated at the bottom of Wellington Street, and had much success until the intervention of the Boer War, when enlistments forced the club into a short recess.

In those early days the Club also played on a ground near the Elwick Hotel, where many stirring tussles were fought against the "Magpies" of that

period. According to information some of the victories at Glenorchy were hard earned as players often had to stand up afterwards to a battery of umbrellas from irate local ladies, and a fusillade of "missiles" from the next door cow paddock.

It is from these rather humble beginnings that the great traditions of the present club were established.

Club colours have always been red and blue, but the style of the uniform has changed. In those early days the guernseys were leather faced and laced up the front. The "shorts" reached to the knee, with the socks fitting right over them and the boots coming well up over the ankles. The colours were in a striped pattern.

The first captain was the late Ted Sykes who died in 1966 at the age of 93, and many of his team mates afterwards distinguished themselves in League ranks.

If they could come back today not many of the players of their times would recognise their old haunts, but one thing is certain, they would be fer-

GROUNDS AND FACILITIES

With the close of another season it is time to review the various aspects of football.

The weather together with increased admission charges have had an adverse effect on attendances to league matches in 1975. For the second successive year continual wet weather has caused the postponement or abandonment of roster matches. The condition of the grounds is causing concern to the ground authorities as well as the League.

At a recent meeting with members of the Parks and Recreation Committee of the Hobart City Council, the League delegates were delighted to learn the Council intends to close the North Hobart Ground at the completion of the current season. During the closure the ground will be re-surfaced and cricket pitches removed.

There are three main factors always to be considered which are of equal importance—

1. Playing surface of the grounds.
2. Facilities for the players.
3. Facilities for the public.

Many suggestions have been put forward this year to remedy the problems of muddy surfaces particularly at N. Hobart. Examination by the Council experts proved beyond doubt the efficiency and effectiveness of the drainage of the North Hobart ground. The problem, as with most other grounds in Hobart, seems to lie in the composition of the surface soil. York Park in Launceston and the Devonport Oval have both experienced similar weather condi-

tions but have stood up to frequent matches without the same damage as at North Hobart.

Experiments have been conducted overseas to place a nylon carpet on the ground, permitting the grass to grow through but protecting the roots and surface soil from damage by players during wet conditions. As our climate is similar to that in Great Britain and Europe these experiments may prove beneficial to us in the years to come.

Facilities for players have been improved at most grounds over the years but North Hobart, T.C.A. and Bellerive are still far below standard.

Advice has been received from the Clarence Council that the visitors room at Bellerive will be demolished at long last. However at this stage it is not certain whether facilities for visiting teams will be available by the commencement of the 1976 season. Clarence may have to spend portion of the season sharing with North Hobart!

The League is preparing plans for further development of the North Hobart ground including new grandstands, player's change rooms and facilities for the public. We feel sure the Hobart City Council will support our moves and assist in obtaining the necessary finance.

Improved facilities for the public has been proved in Victoria to result in increased attendances.

The increased admission charges were necessary to keep the Clubs buoyant but the League is conscious of the need to provide modern and comfortable facilities for its patrons.
