

Jack Gardiner's umpiring continues to go on the up-grade. One mistake Jack made was letting the ruck men have so much latitude. In cases like that, free kicks should be given for the slightest infringement, and the game would be kept clean.

It was the morning after North Hobart's victory against Lefroy, and the youthful sons of a well-known Lefroy supporter were discussing how Lefroy were beaten, when one of them asked: "I wonder, who God barracks for?" This set the pair thinking deeply, but being unable to solve the difficulty, one quaintly remarked, "Anyway, I hope it's for poor old Lefroy."

Bruce Carter was an interested spectator at the match on Saturday, and is slowly getting better again. We trust he will be in his usual place at an early date.

The free kicks were distributed as follows:—Lefroy: First quarter, 10; second, 8; third, 9; fourth, 8. Total, 35. Cananore: First quarter, 5; second, 6; third, 7; fourth, 8. Total, 26.

In the ruck Pennicott received four free kicks; Harris, 4; Margetts, 5; Bailey, 4; Westwood, 2.

The marks taken were:—Lefroy: First quarter, 10; second, 13; third, 11; fourth, 9. Total, 43. Cananore: First quarter, 11; second, 9; third, 10; fourth, 4. Total, 34.

Morrison was, as usual, a tower of strength, and made many brilliant runs and effective kicks. He seems to have taken the hint given in our columns re running too far and losing his kick. This player, with Townley, was very prominent.

The goalkeepers used judgment in kicking off. Placing the ball on the "carpet" gives the tired ruck men battling against the wind breathing time, but Jack should use the whistle—time off!

The gate takings on Saturday, despite such a bitterly cold and windy day, were near the sixties, and as the premiership is becoming very interesting a great crowd should assemble to-day to witness the match between Cananore and North Hobart. Lefroy have beaten Cananore each time, while Cananore have done likewise to North Hobart, so additional interest is attached to to-day's meeting.

On the other wing Bennison had a battle royal with Nicholls, and honours were even, and the Cananore champion winger found a foe man well worthy of his steel. To keen a man like Bennison quiet, and repeatedly beat him, is a most worthy performance, and we congratulate Don, on his great game.

The wind, at least the sportive air, has already spoiled two of the few football matches played, so now it is just about time that the League interviewed the Government Meteorologist to suggest that Saturdays be very fine, and that all days on which the wind wants to have a game be week-days, and not Saturdays. Tommy Carroll was unable to strip, owing to a poisoned knee, but is progressing well, and will be right in a few days. His place was filled by Tottenham, who performed very creditably indeed.

Graves was also unable to strip for Lefroy, and his place was taken by "Bunny" Kimartin. This player has been unfortunate in having windy days each time he has stripped, but the work he put in on Saturday was very creditable, and he promises to be a flyer, having plenty of dash, and is a very good high mark.

A very noted absentee from Saturday's match was the blue can which sometimes appears at the three-quarter interval, but the presence of a bottle—like a water(?) bottle—was much commented on. We are still wondering what the bottle contained. Any suggestion?

Margetts showed much improved form from the previous match, and his tapping out was a great factor to his side's success.

He also won the gold medal for best player in Wanderers for the season; also gold medal for the most consistent player for the Burnie League. Cecil now plays for Cananore, and is the makings of a sterling footballer, and, with Pennicott, is running neck and neck for the Monotone Championship Cup.

Ringrose promises to develop into a great goal sneak. He has got plenty of grit, and that's the main thing.

Hanigan and Geard were like two terriers all the day. At some periods Gardiner had his work cut out to keep peace, but he managed admirably.

Pennicott received more than his share of hard knocks. Perhaps it would be better if he returns a little of what he receives at times.

Jack Robertson was a visitor at the Lefroy match on Saturday, and seat Jack is expected back for the next time Lefroy meets North Hobart.

A correspondent sends us the following par:—"On Saturday last a citizen of our town, and a football enthusiast(?) was detected by one of the gatekeepers trying to get through the pavilion gate with a ticket of last year's date, which had been altered, and, after showing him up, made him pay. The occurrence was reported to the League, and the clubs are now anxiously waiting to see what action that body will be taking in the matter."

make a good man.


Herbie Ward present like a mounted




